Factors to Consider Before Installing Home Solar

Find out your home's energy use Look at your energy bill(s) to review kWh usage for the past 12 to 24 months and calculate the average monthly usage.

Contact your electric utility

Because most residntial systems are tied to the power grid, reach out about connection requirements, fees and possible incentives.

Location, location Start considering panel location. Access the age, size and condition of your roof as well as available ground space.



There are costs other than equipment, such as permitting, installation and inspection. Make sure all costs are included in quotes.

Do your homework Ensure the company you are considering has installers who are specially trained and certified to install solar, among other factors.

To learn more, visit energy.gov and search for "Homeowner's Guide to Going Solar." Use the drop-down titled "How Much Power Can I Generate with Solar" for information on PVWatts, a solar energy production and cost estimator.

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Did you know using your dishwasher is more energy efficient than washing a load of dishes by hand? To maximize efficiency, wash full loads in the dishwasher and don't block the arms or other parts that move while the appliance is in use.

For additional savings, turn on the "air dry" setting instead of using the "heat dry" setting and use a rinse aid to help dishes dry faster without spotting and streaking.
