





FIVE SIMPLE STEPS TO BECOME AN INFORMED CO-OP VOTER

If you could shape the future of our community in five steps, would you? While that might seem like an impossible question, the 2024 general elections are taking place nationwide next month, giving co-op members the opportunity to make your voice heard on issues that affect our community. This election is our chance to elect candidates who support energy policies that

promote safe, reliable, affordable energy.

Co-ops Vote is a non-partisan initiative focused on enhancing the political strength of cooperatives through relationship-building with policy makers. This program was built to give members of the cooperative community the resources and information needed to vote with electric cooperative issues in mind.

- Get Ready by Registering:
 Registering to vote is simple and
 easy! Remember, it's essential to
 regularly check your registration
 and verify that your information is
 correct and up to date.
- 2. Get the Details: Every state's election process is different, and it's important to know about upcoming voter registration deadlines the process for requesting absentee ballots and more. Wisconsin's voter registration deadline is October 16, 2024, and requests for absentee ballots must be received by October 31, 2024. - 3. **Get Informed:** Before you head to the polls, it's important to be educated on the policy issues that help keep our community's power reliable, affordable, and safe. Some of the energy policy issues are highlighted on pages 9, 10, and 11, but you can learn more by joining Voices for Cooperative Power at www.voicesforcooperativepower. com/issues.
- 4. **Get the background:** Once you are registered and informed, it's time to learn about your candidates.
- Get others involved! Now that you've done your research and are officially ready to head to the polls as a Co-op Voter, it's time to get your family, friends, and neighbors involved.

- Autonomy and Independence: Coops are independent and can operate on their own, which ultimately benefits the members.
- Education, Training and Information: Co-ops continuously focus on education to ensure

- employees have the training and information they need to make the co-op successful.
- Cooperation Among Cooperatives:
 Co-ops share, learn, and help each other in times of need.
- 7. Concern for Community: All cooperatives work for the greater good of the local communities they serve. Plus, co-ops give back to their communities!

CO-OPS, DID YOU KNOW




Co-ops are everywhere! Here are some examples of other non-electric cooperatives.

- Ocean Spray, consisting of more than 700 family-owned farms in the U.S.
- Land O'Lakes, consisting of over 1,000 cooperative dairy producers with over 2,700 total members.
- Connexus Credit Union, consisting of over 477,000 members across all 50 states.
- Ellsworth Creamery, consisting of 250 dairy farmer-owners.
- Recreational Equipment, Inc (REI), consisting of 181 locations supplying its members with all their outdoor gear and equipment needs.
