

The 82nd annual meeting of the members of Price Electric Cooperative will be held on Thursday, June 9, 2022, beginning at 6:00 p.m. in the Phillips High School Auditorium, located in the City of Phillips, Wisconsin. The cooperative will provide mail-in ballots for the director elections at least seven days in advance. Please note director election mail-in ballots must be received by noon on Wednesday, June 8, 2022.

1. Reports of officers, directors, committees, and employees.
2. The election of four directors, one each to represent Districts 1, 2, 3 and 8 on the Board of Directors.
3. Vote on proposed bylaw amendments the purpose of which are to eliminate the Rules Committee and to clarify that the Board of Directors may establish rules for member meetings; and to allow vacancies on the Board of Directors to be filled by appointment for the remainder of the existing three-year term.
4. Such other business as may come before the meeting or any other adjournment thereof.

- The meeting will be held at the Phillips High School on June 9. Dinner is served at 5 p.m., with the business meeting beginning at 6 p.m.
- The school is under construction, and currently plans for parking are flexible. Please watch for signs indicating parking and shuttle service from the parking areas to the main door.
- There will be PEC employees available to assist you—just look for helpers in PEC shirts!
- Each membership will receive a ballot by mail. Please be on the lookout for it, and return by mail, payment drop box, at cooperative headquarters, or bring it with you to the meeting. If your ballot is mailed or you drop off in-person or at the payment drop box, please be sure it is received at cooperative headquarters by noon on June 8.
- If you mail your ballot and it is received by the deadline, and you attend the meeting in person, your mail-in vote will be counted, and you will not be provided with another ballot at check in.
- Each membership is permitted one vote.

We are excited to see you in person, and I am particularly looking forward to meeting many of you for the first time since I started here last fall.

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



PRICE ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE 2021 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

The 81st annual meeting of the membership of Price Electric Cooperative was held virtually on June 10, 2021.

The meeting was called to order at 12:00 p.m. by Chairman Randy Kunsch.

Chairman Randy Kunsch led the membership in saying the Pledge of Allegiance. President/CEO William Caynor gave the invocation.

Chairman Randy Kunsch declared a quorum with the registration of 116 members at the meeting.

Chairman Randy Kunsch reviewed the annual meeting rules. The annual meeting rules of order were adopted by unanimous consent.

Attorney Jessica Shrestha read the notice of meeting and proof of mailing.

Attorney Jessica Shrestha reviewed the virtual annual meeting process and mail-in voting process. The virtual annual meeting process and mail-in voting process were ratified by unanimous consent.

Motion by Jennifer Janak, seconded by Eve Lasee, to approve the minutes of the 2020 annual meeting as printed in the June 2021 issue of the *Wisconsin Energy Cooperative News*. Motion carried by unanimous consent.

Caynor presented the CEO report.

Caynor recognized Mike Zierer's retirement from the

Board of Directors and thanked him for his years of service.

Attorney Jessica Shrestha announced the tellers. Price Electric Cooperative employees Theresa Raleigh, Laurie Boettcher, Jenni Janak, and Sheila Stickley were appointed to serve as tellers for the director elections.

Shrestha then announced the results of the director elections to the membership. There were 705 ballots cast by mail. The results were as follows:

- District 4 (uncontested) Randy Kunsch—645
- District 5 Doug Rasmussen—189
Mitchell Meives—490
- District 6 (uncontested) Karen Newbury—645

By unanimous consent the ballots will be destroyed following the meeting.

Members who attended the meeting received a \$25 bill credit, and there was one grand prize winner, Andy Pilch, who received a \$250 bill credit.

Motion was made by Theresa Raleigh, seconded by Wendee Wagner to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried. The meeting was adjourned at 12:48 p.m.

PRICE ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE 2022 PROPOSED BYLAW AMENDMENTS

Note: As part of an ongoing review and a continuing effort to best position the cooperative to meet the members’ needs today and into the future, the board of directors and management recommend the following changes to the Bylaws. New material is underlined – e.g., add these words; deletions are identified by ~~strikeout~~ – e.g., ~~delete these words~~. The purpose of the proposed amendments are to eliminate the Rules Committee and to clarify that the Board of Directors may establish rules for member meetings; and to allow an appointee to a director vacancy to complete the remainder of the existing term. A complete posting of the Articles and Bylaws can be found on Price Electric Cooperative’s website: www.PriceElectric.coop. Copies of the complete listing can also be requested by calling Price Electric Cooperative’s office at 715-339-2155 or 1-800-884-0881. The proposed changes will be voted on at the Annual Meeting on June 9, 2022.

I. Amend Article III, Meeting of the Members, Section 1, Annual & Special Meeting Rules, as follows:

The Board of Directors may in any year ~~appoint a Rules Committee, the majority of which shall be non-director members of the Cooperative. In appointing the Committee, the board shall specify the scope of the Committee’s authority~~

~~and responsibilities, which may include any of the following: establish rules to govern the conduct of the ensuing annual or special meeting of the members, which rules may include a deadline for members to submit any advisory resolutions relating to the affairs of the Cooperative that they plan to present at the annual meeting and other rules related to any such advisory resolutions. The Board of Directors may, considering any proposed advisory resolutions that are timely submitted by members; in consultation with the board and the chief executive officer, and determining whether additional information should be presented to the membership to ensure a full airing of the issue and an informed decision by the membership on the matter.; and reporting to the membership, including if the Committee deems it appropriate to do so making a recommendation concerning disposition of any such resolution.~~

II. Amend Article IV, Directors, Section 4, Vacancies, as follows:

Subject to the provisions of these Bylaws ~~with respect to the removal of directors~~, a vacancy in the office of director shall be filled by a majority vote of the remaining directors and a director thus elected shall serve the remainder of the three-year term left by the vacancy. At the expiration of the term, the usual petition and election process shall take effect.

~~until the next annual meeting of the members or until his successor shall have been elected and shall have qualified.~~

W. Scott Haggard





Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Even in summer months, adding insulation to your attic can keep your home more comfortable and save energy used by your cooling system. If your attic insulation is level with or below your floor joists (meaning you can easily see your joists), you should add more. If you can't see any of the floor joists because the insulation is well above them, you likely have enough insulation.

Attic insulation should be evenly distributed with no low spots. Make sure the areas along the eaves are adequately covered.

ANNUAL MEETING RULES AND VOTING PROCEDURES

1. The meeting will be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, except as specifically modified below.
2. Only members will be recognized by the Chair. Members will be recognized by their voting cards received at registration for the meeting.
3. Members should give their name and township when speaking. Each member's comments will be limited to three minutes with any rebuttal limited to two minutes.
4. Advisory resolutions not submitted to the Rules Committee prior to the April 4, 2022, published deadline for resolutions will not be considered.

All voting will be by delegate voting card; there will be no voice voting.
